

THE PUBLIC WITNESS OF CHRIST



Dear Redeemed Saints,

How does our outward confession of Christ fit into the public square! In the last few weeks, we have experienced

some very powerful examples of this, both good and evil.

On January 18, a mob stormed into a Baptist congregation's worship service in the Twin Cities. Their stated goal was to protest the congregation. The unstated goal shown by the way it was carried out was to intimidate and harass.

That is exactly what happened.

There are respectful and legal ways to protest. There are ways to disagree with people that do not give way to anarchy and lawlessness. January 18 in the Twin Cities was not one of them.

On January 23, an estimated 70,000 people gathered in Washington, D.C., to publicly protest abortion and legislation that makes it legal to end human life. The march was publicly planned. The March for Life team worked with authorities to develop a route. Streets were closed, legally. Nothing was vandalized. Our public leaders, such as Vice President J.D. Vance, spoke on supporting life issues. Signs were handmade, with positive — not vulgar — messages, such as "Everyone deserves a birthday," and, "Life is a gift." The LCMS signs quoted Psalm 139 and simply said, "Fearfully and wonderfully made." We sang hymns as we marched in the public square. We held pro-life signs a quiet witness to the truth and power of God working though His Word.

In these last few paragraphs, I have reflected on two protests in the public

square, just a week apart. The January 18th event was more about power and intimidation, calling the evil they initiated good and the good of Christians gathering in worship, evil.



The January 23 March for Life was respectful. It worked hard to keep the 4th Commandment: "Honor your father and mother," This commandment includes those in authority over us. The March for Life, very much in the public square, promoted things God loves and calls good, life, family, His Word, and authority.

The prophet Isaiah writes in Chapter 5, "Woe to those who call evil good and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness, who put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter!" This deception to reframe reality started in the Garden when the evil one said, "Did God really say ...?"

If we are not continually grounded in God's Word and the gifts He gives to each of us the deception of evil calling itself good can quickly confuse us and lead us into evil, as well.

Dear Baptized Saints, we are not helpless in this present evil age. We are led and protected by the Victorious one. Jesus Christ beat every trap and deception the evil one throws at us. He

is risen from death's grasp and promises that for you as well. He has wisdom in all things and says to us, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom" (Psalm 111:10).

The bold confession we have as sons and daughters of the King has dome very powerful tools to bring our hope to the public square.

Pray for wisdom. Pray for our enemies. Pray for strength to disagree publicly (with respect and honoring our authorities) when the wisdom of the world does not agree with God's wisdom. Pray for safety in our cities. Pray for persecuted Christians.

Dear Saints, be in worship. Be in God's Word. Encourage one another and remember what St. Peter writes: "But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect" (1 Peter 3:15).



This is exactly how we confess our risen Christ Jesus in the public square — marching in the public square and letting Christ's light shine.

Congregations can now receive a monthly printable newsletter, allowing each church to distribute it as they see fit.

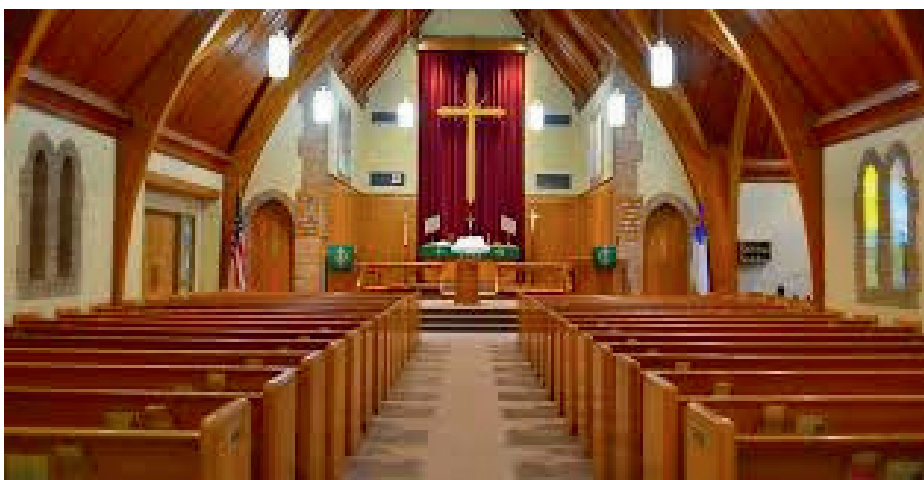

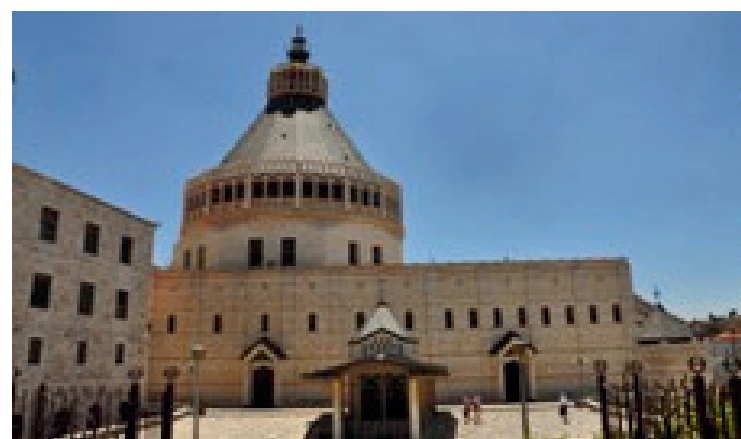

personal journey of loss but also of peace and joy. This month I have a wonderful opportunity to share with you the 2026 LWML Prayer Service Theme:

P.R.A.Y.E.R. - Praise, Remember, Ask, Yield, Excitement, Rejoice

The 2026 LWML Prayer Service, based on the acronym P.R.A.Y.E.R., is a classic, yet updated, service from over a decade ago.

The service was authored by Rev. Barrie E. Henke, former LCMS Oklahoma District President from 2009 to 2022 and the LWML Oklahoma District Pastoral

Counselor from 2004 to 2010. He also served as Senior Pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Edmond, Okla., as well as other congregations in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Oklahoma. Rev. Henke received his crown of life in March 2023. Rev. Henke wrote that the service “prompts the participants to remember that God does not speak to His children in prayer. Rather, His children speak to Him, assured that He readily speaks to them in His Word and in the Sacraments, as the Holy Spirit gives His divine counsel through very clear direction or, sometimes, His ‘nudging.’”

The LWML Prayer Service is designed to be used at any time by large or small groups. This prayer service is copyrighted by the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. The use of this prayer service outside of LWML events requires permission from the LWML and other copyright holders. That includes you and me, who are privileged with Peter, James, John, Moses, and Elijah to see the reality hidden in human flesh. God, the Lord Himself, has come down to us in our sinful state to free us from our sin and the evil tyrant. So, He ventured down the mount into the valley “of the shadow of death,” and immediately casts out an evil spirit from the boy. So, He also ventured from that valley to the mount of death, Golgotha, to raise Himself up as the Sacrifice to the

Counselor's Corner

IN THE VALLEY OF THE SHADOW OF DEATH

As we approach Ash Wednesday, the ashes are to serve as a reminder of two inescapable things: your sin and your death because of your sin.

What a way to start an article!

But as we come down from the glory of Christmas, the bright light of Epiphany, the glorious appearance of the Transfiguration, we are met with a sobering reality – the horrible weight of our sin and the deadly consequences of our transgressions. It is not something that we want to do, or maybe even feel ready to do, so the ashes are imposed on us, not as an end in itself, but a driver towards the Finisher of our faith.

See, through the church year, the church breathes the life of her Lord. It is not so much that we are

Father on behalf of all men, winning the forgiveness of sins for all of us, and casting out the old accuser. The Seed of the woman has bruised the serpent's head, his power, to accuse the saints of sin.

This is why Psalm 51 has two parts. This Psalm, traditionally used as an entrance Psalm on Ash Wednesday, is first a confession of sins. Many of us may even sing it in our heads, as it is the psalm used for the offertory in Divine Service setting 3.

This is good. We truly need to examine our lives by God's Law, recognize our complete sinfulness and confess it to Him. But there is unshakeable hope and utter confidence in God's mercy in this Psalm, too. David says, “Purge me with hyssop and I shall be clean, wash me and I will be whiter than snow” (51:7).

If God gives the cleansing, the sinner will be cleaned, for “against You and You only have I sinned and done what is evil in Your sight” (Psalm 51:4).

Thanks be to God! “The blood of Jesus cleanses us from all sin” (1 John 1:7).

Let the ashes be imposed on you, and hear the condemnation, “Dust you are and to dust you will return” (Genesis 3:19).

Wash the ashes from your head and hear the promise, “You were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God” (1 Corinthians 6:11). You were baptized into Christ, Whose blood cleanses you from all sin.

STANDING FOR LIFE, EVERY TIME

I remember growing up and hearing of Todd Akin’s fumbles with the issue of victims of rape and incest. He was running for US Representative, and he said a few things that were uneducated but also a few things that were reasonable. He was savaged by the news and his party called for him to drop out of the race.

This same issue became a foible for Rick Santorum when he was faced with the question, if his daughter was raped and became pregnant as a result, how would he advise she move forward? Santorum said he would counsel her to keep the baby.

Santorum probably destroyed whatever chance he had to be president that day.

This issue of pregnancy as the result of rape is a political hand grenade because the conception itself occurs under terrible circumstances and great evil.

Of course, God does not want these things to happen. Neither does He want people to steal, kill or worship idols against His will. Yet, these crimes happen.

After these notable politicians and public figures spoke about these issues and were roundly maligned and criticized by the media and public, I believe we Christians were scared to speak a very sensible truth. I have heard people in my congregations say they are against abortion, “except in the case of rape or incest.” I have heard members of my own family say it. I have heard friends say it.

We are afraid to be challenged or even rejected if we challenge this idea.

I want to make a case that aborting babies conceived by rape and incest is still an injustice. In such a case, there is a victim, which is the mother. There is an attacker, which is the father. The baby is innocent of its father’s crimes and on top of that could very well become a victim if faced with the nature of how he or she came to be born and the pain that the mother and others endured.

We should feel empathy for the women who go through these terrible situations. We should love them and support these mothers. But we should not support the killing of innocent children.

We stand for life as LCMS people. Our witness must be consistent and strong. No circumstances of conception should be used as confirmation for abortion. Our language matters. We should decry these kinds of crimes with every amount of energy we have, but we should not condemn to death any baby.

Take some time to research people like Rebecca Kiessling, Ryan Bomberger, or Mark Roepke. Mark Roepke said in an interview, “I was conceived in rape ...The circumstances of my conception do not determine my worth as a human being. I have a right to life. And the sins of my father do not fall on me.”

All of these and many more like them have taken up the banner to thank their mothers for giving birth to them even through the pain but also to advocate for all people conceived in rape or incest.

Our confession on this issue must be strong and unafraid. Our lives may be eighty or ninety years, perhaps more. And then we will live forever with Christ! Make the bold confession for life in all circumstances. There is no sub-section of babies we throw away because of how they were conceived. We must remove this phrase from our vernacular and be willing to have hard conversations and speak for the sanctity of life.

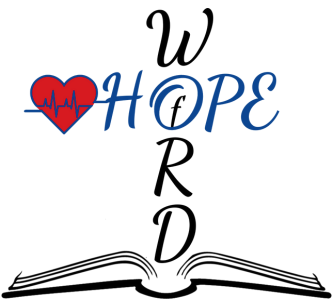

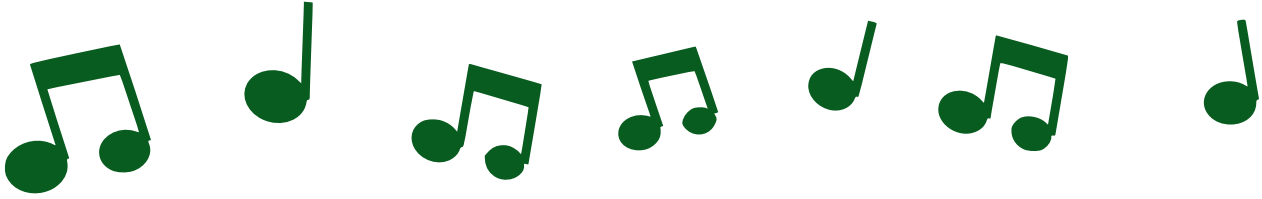
